

Common Core: Top-Down Control of American Education!

Common Core State Standards: What you've been told

- Claim: Not a Federal Program
 - Common Core is a NATIONAL curriculum, contrary to federal law.
 - Federally-funded assessments. The Federal Government granted \$330 Million to two consortia to write the Common Core assessments: Smarter Balance Assessment Consortia (SBAC) and PARCC. Utah is a governing member of SBAC
 - Federal Government is encouraging and incentivizing Common Core. <u>Race to the Top Grants</u> "encouraged" adoption of the Common Core Standards. No Child Left Behind <u>waivers</u>, conditioned on adoption of Common Core.
- Claim: State-led initiative
 - The National Governors' Association was peripherally involved in the standards: The <u>NGA Center for Best</u>
 Practices (an associated entity of the National Governors Association), <u>CCSSO</u>, and <u>NCEE</u> developed the standards
 - O **Big-money was involved in the creation and implementation:** The NGA Center, the CCSSO, and the NCEE received millions of dollars from the <u>Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation</u>, among other interested parties.
- Claim: Higher Standards
 - Math standards are "too close to call" compared to Utah's current standards. The Fordham Foundation says
 <u>Utah's current standards are an A-minus</u>, as are Common Core's. Incidentally, the Fordham Foundation received a grant from the <u>Gates Foundation</u> "to develop supportive materials"
 - o **14 states have the same or higher standards for English.** Utah may want to adopt more rigorous English standards. There are 14 states, besides the Common Core, to choose from. Three are superior to Common Core.
 - The SBAC Math assessments focus on communication skills and standards that are not testable. Also, the standards allow 'fuzzy math' curricula, previously rejected by the state board.
- Claim: We still have local control
 - Removes local control: Standards lead to assessments which lead to curricula. Parents, teachers, and legislators will be shut out from the state education standards.
 - Won't adopt Social Studies and Science Standards because they are too controversial, but the English standards
 include "Literacy in History/Social Studies, Science, and Technical Subjects"
 - O As a governing member of SBAC, <u>Utah has already promised to fully implement the assessments</u> by 2014-15.
- Truth: Extensive cost to taxpayers to implement.

Resolutions against the Common Core State Standards have been advanced by

- the <u>National Federation of Republican Women</u> (unanimous approval)
- the <u>American Legislative Exchange Council</u>* (ALEC)
- Closing the Door on Innovation (a conglomeration of national education leaders and policy writers)
- <u>National Council of Teachers of English</u> (NCTE) <u>passed a resolution against Common Core in 2010</u> but are officially neutral on adoption
